Workshop Notes: Imagining Welcome Through Arts and Culture

Discussion Group 1: Positive and negative things about organisational practices in the arts

Negative:

- Lack of recognition and legacy
 - Working with volunteers and taking their stories without payment
 - o After the project people feel let down on not engaged in ongoing way
- Working with people should be organic and authentic
- Partnerships should happen across sectors
- Diversity needed within all aspects of organisations including board members and senior staff
- Refugee-related work and representation doesn't need to focus only on the bad stories – positive should also be shared
- Important to remember intersectionality
- Safeguarding and creating policy that is public within an organisation
 - We'd love to see more awareness of safeguarding and resources that ethically engage with individuals and communities

Positive:

- Commitment to understand cultures of people we live and work with
- Creating opportunities for peer support
- Consulting with all kinds of people what are people's aspirations?
- Collaboration is encouraged in the arts
- Giving ownership of the work created to those who have shared their experiences
- Offering training opportunities

- Partnerships with organisations like Counterpoints Arts has given practitioners confidence to learn and explore these big topics with an appreciation of their complexities and nuances
- Recognising that partnerships are a strength and that it is okay to see the shortcomings within a given organisation

Discussion Group 2: Conversation on Arts production and programming

- Can 'pay it forward' approach be a way to connect with different people?
- Participation: encouraging people with lived experience to be involved, including in making decisions
- Focus on languages and particularly translation
- Importance of ownership
- How do we get access to communities? Especially for cross-generation collaboration
- Collaborating and having authentic partnerships that allow everyone to do their best work. This also comes with trust in other people

Discussion Group 3: How do we make arts spaces more accessible?

- Outreach, breaking down the barriers of art spaces
 - o Art spaces can be intimidating, we need to combat this
- Having community promoters and ambassadors
- Working toward integration, especially when it comes to refugees
- Diversity in leadership
